Leading up to the conference, there are three Pre AM/PIC educational subject matter tours (animal science, horticulture and natural resources) to choose from if that interests you.



Sundays Opening Session will feature Inspirational Speaker Frank Beamer who was the head football coach at Virginia Tech from 1987 until his final game in 2015. Coach Beamer was one of the longest tenured active coaches in NCAA Division I FBS and, at the time of his retirement, was the winningest active coach at that level. During his tenure, he coached the Hokies to 23 consecutive bowl games, including a national championship appearance, along with seven conference championship titles.

Our Monday Morning Keynote speaker will be Michele Payne. She is known for being a community catalyst, a passionate advocate for global agriculture and antagonizing people into action. Michele will help you stand up and celebrate the people, promise and passion of agriculture. She will make you laugh and cry while celebrating all types of agriculture. Find inspiration and new "fighting moves" that will get you thinking about our opportunity for the conversation and agricultural advocacy around the food plate.

Monday and Tuesday will feature the awards related luncheons. This year we plan to combine the Search for Excellence luncheons for efficiency and to make them similar in size – paired will be Livestock/4-H, Horticulture/Forestry, Crop Production/Farm Ranch and Young Farmer/ Sustainable Ag.

President's Corner....

For the kids, the Virginia agents have planned an exciting array of trips to local attractions and fun activities including the Virginia Aquarium and Adventure Park, Bush Gardens, the historical Jamestown Settlement and much more.

The highlight of the week will be the Distinguished Service Award banquet on Wednesday, where we recognize the hard work and accomplishments of over 60 NACAA members.

On Thursday, you will have a choice of attending one 24 professional improvement tours that will highlight Virginia's rich agricultural diversity.

The Virginia agents have planned a fantastic meeting which will showcase Virginia as a prime location to live, work, do business, and explore in addition to highlighting the state's \$91 billion agriculture and forestry industries. In addition to the educational and professional improvement opportunities for agents, there is a lot to do in and around Virginia Beach, so you will want to consider bringing the entire family.

Surrounded by the Chesapeake Bay, Atlantic Ocean and countless rivers, you will never be far from the water in Virginia Beach. The Virginia Beach Boardwalk has been named one of the top five boardwalks in the nation and families will certainly enjoy the many things to do on the boardwalk, and kids will love the many amusement options on offer. To make sure that you have plenty of time to enjoy the ocean breeze and sight-see, Monday night will feature "dinner on your own" on the boardwalk to allow you time to network with colleagues and enjoy the wonderful sights, sounds and tastes of the boardwalk as you make your way to the 4-H Talent Review which will be held in the 24th street park on the boardwalk. Before you leave be sure to pose with the large 34-foot statue of King Neptune prominently displayed on the boardwalk.

The Theme of the meeting – Virginia Where It All Began – references the historical importance of the area. Nearby is the well named Historic Triangle of Colonial Virginia, which encompasses Jamestown, Williamsburg and Yorktown, an area where early American history abounds.

Jamestown settlement in the Colony of Virginia was the first permanent English settlement in the Americas. It was located on the northeast bank of the James and was established by the Virginia Company of London on May 4, 1607 and was considered permanent after a brief abandonment in 1610. It followed several failed attempts, including the Lost Colony of Roanoke, established in 1585 on Roanoke Island. Jamestown served as the colonial capital from 1616 until 1699.

Not far away is Colonial Williamsburg, its 301-acre historic area includes several hundred restored or re-created buildings from the

18th century, when the city was the capital of Colonial Virginia. An interpretation of a colonial American city, the historic area includes three main thoroughfares and their connecting side streets depict the atmosphere and the circumstances of 18th-century Americans. Yorktown is home of Colonial National Historical Park, which contains and preserves Yorktown National Battlefield the site of the siege and subsequent surrender of General Charles Cornwallis to General George Washington and the French Fleet during the American Revolutionary War on October 19, 1781. This British defeat at Yorktown effectively ended the war. The battlefield has many of the earthworks dug by the besieging American and French forces.

The military has a large presence in the region with well over a dozen facilities in the area. Naval Air Station Oceana is a military airport located in Virginia Beach and is a United States Navy master jet base. Home to seventeen strike fighter squadrons of F/A-18 Hornets and F/A-18 Super Hornets, while at the conference you will be awestruck by the frequent roar of fighter jets flying overhead on daily training missions.

Naval Station Norfolk is a United States Navy base in Norfolk, Virginia, that is the headquarters and home port of the U.S. Navy's Atlantic Fleet. It is the world's largest naval station, with the largest concentration of U.S. Navy forces with 75 ships calling this home port.

The Norfolk Naval Shipyard is a U.S. Navy facility in Portsmouth, Virginia, for building, remodeling, and repairing the Navy's ships. I think you will agree that Virginia has a lot to offer. Be sure to bring the entire family, as there will be plenty of educational, recreational, and cultural activities and opportunities for everyone. I believe this is one meeting you will not want to miss! I look forward to seeing you this summer in Virginia Beach.

Opening Ceremonies feature Hall of Famer, Frank Beamer

he 2020 Annual Meeting and Professional Improvement Conference opens Sunday evening with an inspirational flair. VA Beach is home to Oceana Naval Air Station and Hampton Roads Naval Base, the world's largest naval installation. Our presentation of colors will be led by servicemen from Little Creek.

After we recognize each of our State and territorial members with the flag ceremony, we will be treated to words from a native Virginian and fellow educator, Coach Frank Beamer. Growing up in rural Southwestern Virginia, Coach Beamer played football at VA Tech under Jerry Claiborne while earning a degree in Distributive Education. His first coaching job was at Radford High School, and soon moved to the college ranks. He coached at the Citadel, Maryland, and Murray State, working with future legends of the game, Coaches Bobby Ross and Ralph Friedgen, and players such as Future Pro HOF member, Randy White of the Dallas Cowboys.

Coming home can be tough in this line of work, but Coach Beamer returned to VA Tech in 1987. He guided the Hokies Football program for the next 29 seasons. There were plenty of bumps along the way, but Coach Beamer never wavered. "How many people do you think would survive today, 2-8-1 in their sixth year?"

Beamer said during an interview follow his induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. "I'm just glad I didn't upset anybody in those first five or six years. I was trying to make friends."

Beamer won 238 games for his alma mater, seven conference championships — three in the Big East and four in the ACC — and reached the 2000 BCS national championship game. He established a bowl streak, now in its 26th straight season, and a double-digit win streak over rival Virginia. His overall 280-143-4 record ranks sixth among FBS coaches.

Coach Beamer sent many players on to the NFL, but stated "... we had a lot of guys that became doctors and lawyers and good business people and good educators, so I felt that was kind of the simple answer that we were going to do everything that we can while we're here to make these people better. And that's what we worked for."

He also gave freely of his time, helping with community programs encouraging reading (Frank's Mom Herma was a classroom teacher) and assisting 4-H Clubs with items for charity auctions. He and his staff routinely walked the campus for exercise and to chat with students and staff along the way. Coach knows a thing or two about building community support and buy-in!

Coach Beamer knows a thing or two about building successful people and we will gain some of his wisdom Sunday evening as he speaks to "Three Critical Qualities of Success." Be sure not to miss this opportunity to hear from one of Virginia's favorite native sons and a true southern gentleman

2020 AM/PIC Horticulture Committee Pre-Conference Tour: July 17th & 18th

Cost for tour participants: \$130

The 2020 AM/PIC Horticulture Pre-tour is designed to give participants a glimpse of Virginia's diverse horticultural industry and all it has to offer to our Commonwealth, as well as the rest of the world. We wanted to specifically focus on the history of Virginia horticulture, together with the sustainable practices that have been in use since our Founding Fathers began planting their own gardens. In addition, the tour will emphasize continued and new practices that have sustained traditional agriculture and brought to the fore-front the sustainability of new practices in urban agriculture and home horticulture.

The tour will depart from the Virginia Beach Conference Center on Day 1. The tour will overnight in Charlottesville, so please bring what you will need for an overnight stay. The tour will return to Virginia Beach on the second day in time for evening AM/PIC events.

Day 1 Tour: Friday, July 17, 2020

8:00 a.m. Depart Virginia Beach Conference Center (Virginia Beach Convention Center, 1000 19th St, Virginia Beach, VA 23451) public and private entities cooperating to restore diminished habitat unique to the region and with it the endangered Red cockaded woodpecker. Next stop, a visit to the Southampton Heritage Village/Agriculture & Forestry Museum.

On our way to the final stop of the day, a great big famous swamp! The Great Dismal Swamp has been a National Wildlife Refuge since the mid 1970's and spans into North Carolina with over 100,000 acres of forested wetlands and includes a 3100-acre lake in the middle. Today, while elements of history are still being discovered, the area is home to bears & bob cats, 65 species of butterflies, river otters and over 220 different birds.

Thomas Jefferson's Monticello (931 Thomas Jefferson Pkwy, Charlottesville, VA 22902) for garden tour and open tour

Jefferson's Monticello garden was a Revolutionary American garden. One wonders if anyone else had ever before assembled such a collection of vegetable novelties, culled from virtually every western culture known at the time, then disseminated by Jefferson with the persistence of a religious reformer, a seedy evangelist. Here grew the earth's melting pot of immigrant vegetables: an Ellis Island of introductions, the whole world of hardy economic plants: 330 varieties of eighty-nine species of vegetables and herbs, 170 varieties of the finest fruit varieties known at the time. Equally important are Jefferson's contributions to sustainable agriculture – support of local farmers, emphasis on a vegetable-focused cuisine, and development of a garden that focused on American conditions and included American plants. He lived his famous quotation "The greatest service which can be rendered any country is to add a useful plant to its culture." Participants will attend the Highlights Tour. This is a private two-hour experience tailored around history and horticulture, that covers the first floor of the home as well as the flower and vegetable gardens. Participants will have opportunities to walk around and self-immerse in the beauty and history of Monticello. www.monticello.org

Barboursville Vineyards (17655 Winery Rd, Barboursville, VA 22923) tasting, tour, history

The Barbour family preserved this priceless landscape in pastoral farming from the middle of the 18th Century through the middle of the 20th, by the wise rotation of crops and a continuous maintenance of sheep grazing. It was the second-generation heir, James Barbour, born 1775, who set the plantation on that path of sustainable agricultural practices while others, lamentably, depleted their soils in singular commitment to tobacco. Barbour took his turn as President of the Albemarle Agricultural Society (1825), the most prominent and scientifically forward-looking farm association in the region in its day, and was active in the Virginia Agricultural Convention 10 years later, proposing significant educational innovations including an experimental farm and an agriculture chair at the University of Virginia, which were adopted generations later at Virginia Tech.

Tour by Luca Paschina, winemaker and general manager at Barboursville Vineyards for an introduction to the storied estate history and winemaking processes. Tastings are included in this tour of beautiful Italian inspired Virginia wines. The Octagon Barrel Room presents a permanent exhibition of the biography of their signature wine, Octagon, and a brief film about the estate is shown throughout the day. Participants may guide themselves on a tour of the Landmark Ruins, one of Jefferson's true architectural masterpieces. In its elegant Palladian proportions and siting on a gentle knoll, the house unmistakably recalls Jefferson's own, and deeply refreshes our appreciation of structural balance in wine. https://www.bbvwine.com

Friday, July 17, 2020 – Roanoke, VA to Farmville, VA Stop 1: Tuck Farms. Tuck Farms is an Angus and commercial cattle operation situated on 350 acres in Moneta, Virginia, operated by Keith Tuck. The farm utilizes rotational grazing and implements best management programs from the National Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) and Peaks of Otter Soil and Water Conservation District. Keith was named the 2017 Virginia Forage and Grassland Council's "Outstanding Forage Producer of the Year" and is currently the Vice President of the Virginia Forage and Grassland Council (VFGC). Tuck Farms also participates in value added feeder cattle sales through the Bedford Beef Producers' Association and Springlake Stockyards, an LMA member.

Stop 2: Locust Level Farm. Locust Level Farm is an Angus seedstock cattle operation owned and operated by Michael McDowell. The family farm has its origins as a cattle, tobacco and grain operation, but began focusing on purebred angus cattle after Mike graduated from Virginia Tech in 1978. They utilize both embryo transfer and artificial insemination programs to improve the herd and have received numerous awards for conservation efforts such as improving water quality through cross fencing, improved rotational grazing, cover crops and livestock stream exclusion. Michael was recently named the 2019 Swisher Sweets/ Sunbelt Expo Southeastern Farmer of the Year and is involved with a variety of local agricultural events, including volunteering with the both 4-H and FFA, the local livestock show, and the Virginia Angus Breeder's Show, held in nearby Chatham.

Stop 3: Knoll Crest Farm. Knoll Crest is a seedstock cattle operation, offering purebred cattle genetics since 1944, when James Bennett and his father Paul D. purchased their first polled Hereford heifer. Today the cow herd numbers 800 females and has consistently produced top genetics in the Hereford, Gelbvieh and Angus breeds. The farm remains a family operation with James's sons Paul, Brian and Jim Bennett along with grandson Dalton all working on the farm. Bull sales are first Friday in December and second Saturday in April. Both sales account for about 350 bulls sold annually at the farm. Bulls have been sold to Select Sires, ABS, Alta Genetics, Genex SEMEX, ST Genetics and countless satisfied purebred and commercial cattle producers.

Saturday, July 18, 2020 – Farmville, VA to Virginia Beach, VA **Stop 5:** S and R Meat Goats. S and R Meat goats began in 2010 with the acquisition of a herd of does from Chandler Show Goats and the lease of the buck "TEXAS INK" from Glen Martin in Mason, TX. Over the last 9 years S and R meat goats has

successfully grown in the goat show industry, raising numerous show winners in both breeding does and market goats. Notably, S and R Meat Goats is a huge supporter of 4-H and FFA youth livestock programs as well as the Virginia Showmasters Circuit. S and R Meat Goats number one goal is to raise wethers that are heavy muscled, structurally correct and easy to feed.

Stop 6: Virginia Dept. of Corrections Agribusiness - State Farm James River Facility. The Virginia Dept of Corrections Agribusiness Program is the farm system for the correctional centers of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The goal of the program is to improve the job skills and re-entry success of offenders, reduce food expense for the Commonwealth within the correctional system, and improve agricultural production through working with other state agencies and institutions, notably Virginia Cooperative Extension, and the Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station. As part of this agreement, Virginia Tech's Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine provides veterinary services for the purpose of improving herd health and instruction opportunities for veterinary students. Research and demonstration projects by graduate students, Extension and other university faculty are also conducted. Starting in 2013, milk from Virginia Tech's dairy farm began traveling every other day to the VADOC Grade A milk processing plant inside Powhatan Correctional to be pasteurized and homogenized and shipped back to VT for dining hall consumption, a win-win for both organizations.

Stop 7: Richlands Dairy and Creamery. Richlands Dairy Farm has its origins in the Jones family dating back to the 1700s. Ray Jones transitioned the mainly tobacco farm to dairy in 1952. The farm is home to approx. 800 acres and 500 total head of cattle. In response to changing markets, the Jones Family decided to open Richlands Creamery in June 2019. The Creamery focuses on ice cream but also promotes other dairy products such as whole milk, 2%, chocolate, heavy cream, seasonal eggnog and half and half. Richlands believes in transparency in agriculture and promotes agritourism heavily as part of their operation. Richlands hosts events, dairy dinners, regular tours, and festivals in accordance with their motto, "Honest to Goodness Dairy."

Stop 8: Land of Promise Farms. Land of Promise Farms occupies a leading place in Virginia's livestock industry is a leading supplier of proven show pig genetics. The farm's history in the hog industry began in 1959 as a registered Hereford operation. In the 1990s Ryan and Shane Horsley began moving the operation toward club and show pig production. The farm holds two online sales each year and sells pigs via private treaty. Genetics focus on proven show ring champions using AI and crossbreeding. The farm also includes a significant row crop operation, with corn, soybeans and wheat being primary cash crops. Additional niche markets of sweet corn and u-pick pecan orchard for fall and winter add diversity to the operation. Don Horsley was selected the 2011 Virginia Farmer of the Year.

Agricultural Issues Super Seminar -"Adapting Ag to a Changing Climate"

<u>1:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m.</u>

Intended audience: County Extension Agents that want to learn more about the effects of climate change on crop and animal production.

Topics covered: Is agriculture ready for climate change? The adaptability of farmers and their crops will determine the future of agricultural sustainability and global food security. This presentation will discuss how to communicate the need to adapt and prepare for extreme weather events. It's not about politics and it's not about how or why we got here. It's about doing what's best for our farmers and making sure they have the facts they need to make informed choices about their farming operations.

Speaker: Pam Knox is the Director of the UGA Weather Network, a network of 86 stations around the state which have been recording weather and climate data starting in 1991. She is also an agricultural climatologist for the University of Georgia in the Department of Crop and Soil Sciences, which is part of the College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences. In that position she provides outreach and education on climate and its effects on crops and livestock in the Southeastern US. She also provides weather and climate data and analyses to university scientists and user groups across the region. In addition, she is a regional coordinator for the volunteer CoCoRaHS (Community Cooperative Rain Hail and Snow) rainfall network in Georgia and is serving on the advisory board for the Georgia Weather Network. Pam is also an active Certified Consulting Meteorologist in the areas of forensic meteorology and climatology.

In the past Pam has also worked as the Georgia Assistant State Climatologist, the Wisconsin State Climatologist and in the National Weather Service. She also previously served as President of the American Association of State Climatologists and on the American Meteorological Society's Board of Applied Climatology and Board of Continuing Professional Development. She now serves on the technical advisory boards for the Southeast Regional Climate Center (NOAA) and the Southeast Regional Climate Hub (USDA).

2020 NACAA AM/PIC Professional Improvement Tours

Tour 1 - Richmond Horticulture



Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden (Also on the Horticulture **Pre-tour**) offers year-round beauty on a historic property with more than 50 acres of spectacular gardens. A classical domed Conservatory is the only one of its kind in the mid-Atlantic. More than a dozen themed gardens include a Children's Garden, Rose Garden, Asian Valley and Cherry Tree Walk. Then we will head to Maymont, a 100-acre Victorian estate and public park. It contains Maymont Mansion, now a historic house museum, an arboretum, formal gardens, a carriage collection, native wildlife exhibits, a nature center, and Children's Farm. Participants will have the opportunity to explore the grounds of Maymont or visit a research site where efforts to combat boxwood blight are ongoing. This tour will require a 2.5-hour bus ride each way. Participants should expect to walk for long periods of time. 10 hour day

Tour 2 - Perdue Poultry

Perdue is a third-generation, family owned, U.S. food and agriculture company. Perdue was founded in 1920 by Arthur Perdue and is celebrating its 100th anniversary in 2020 as one of the largest producers of broilers in America. This tour will begin with a visit to Perdue's Hatchery in Murfreesboro, N.C. Guests will see the process of incubation and hatching chicks for delivery to local poultry farms. Next, the tour will visit one of Perdue's modern poultry farms where guests will see chickens being raised using modern innovative equipment. From there the tour will have lunch at North Carolina State University Research Station in Lewiston, N.C. to hear about Virginia Type peanut varieties grown in northeast North Carolina and southeast Virginia. In the afternoon guests will have a guided tour at Perdue's Poultry Processing Plant in Lewiston, N.C. This



facility was put into operation in 1977 and continues to be the largest poultry processing plant on the east coast. Guests will see up close the most modern equipment and techniques for delivering the PERDUE® brand of fresh chicken. No one who has been on a poultry farm in the last 5-days will be allowed and protective equipment will be required. Closed toe shoes please. Light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1 mile total = Handicap challenging. 10.5 hour day

Tour 3 - Altria, Inc. Tobacco



Tobacco had already been used in America by the time European settlers arrived. American Indian tribes historically carried tobacco in pouches as a readily accepted trade item, as well as smoking it in cultural ceremonies. Tobacco smoke was seen as carrying one's thoughts and prayers to the spirits. Tobacco was taken back to Europe where it where it became popular, thereby fueling colonization. This tour will visit Altria Inc., in Richmond, VA. Altria Inc. is the parent company of Philip Morris USA, producer of Marlboro cigarettes. The first stop will be at Altria Park 500 facility, adjacent to the historic neighborhood of



Bermuda Hundred in Chester, Va. Property has been in agriculture production longer than any other farm in the U.S. John Rolfe (1585–1622) early English settler once farmed here. He is credited with the first successful cultivation of tobacco as an export crop in the Colony of Virginia. This facility processes small pieces of tobacco from other Phillip Morris USA locations and turns them into large tobacco sheets. Next stop is Altria Manufacturing Center which spans 1.6 million square feet. Altria makes all their cigarettes at this facility, which represent half of all cigarettes sold in the U.S. Lunch will be at this facility. In the afternoon, guests will visit Turner Family Farm owned by Donald Turner and his 2 sons, David and Jaime. The Turners farm about 250 acres of flue cured tobacco. They have recently started farming about 120 acres of hemp for CBD oil. They have a state-of-the-art curing system for their tobacco and use the latest machinery for harvesting. Donald won Sunbelt Farmer of the Year for Virginia in 2015. Light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1 mile total

Tour 4 - Pamunkey, Angus, Antique Tractors, and World Record Corn



We'll visit the Pamunkey Indian Tribe, Virginia's first federally recognized tribe. This historical tribe was one of the most powerful groups of the Powhatan paramountcy when the English arrived in 1607. They still retain reservation lands assigned by the 1646 and 1677 treaties with the English colonial government. Since 1918, the Pamunkey have been operating a continuously upgraded fish hatchery- first for the restoration of native shad, and more recently to restore the endangered Atlantic sturgeon from newly constructed spawning reefs in the improved waters of the James River. Next we'll meander over to Edgewood Angus for a hosted lunch and learn about this multigenerational operation utilizing AI breeding on purebred Angus consigning bulls to the Virginia Beef Cattle Improvement Association annually the mid-80s. Edgewood Angus uses many tools (pedigrees, EPD's, AHIR data, genomic testing,

phenotypic data and cow family history) to offer "honest cattle" that speak for themselves, so much so that bulls are guaranteed for 4 years (also on the Animal Science Pre-tour). Lastly we will visit David Hula's 612 bushel world record corn. This is Hula's fourth world record. David, John and Jeff Hula, third generation producers, continue the long tradition of providing high-quality cereal and soybean seed to the Mid-Atlantic and Southeastern farming communities. Renwood Farms produces USG wheat and soybean seed, public wheat, oats and barley varieties, as well as Renwood proprietary wheat seed varieties, seed treatments and inoculants. While we're there we'll take a gander at their impressive collection of antique tractors. This tour will require about a two hour ride by bus each way and inclu@s moderate walking in farm field situations. Closed toe shoes are advised. \sim 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging. 10 hour day

Tour 5 - Beverly Hillbillies -Gas Titanium Biomass Solar



Come and listen to some stories about some former farmers who loaded up their trucks and moved to Beverly. The expansion of energy options and mineral demand has pushed land use conversions in some cases and has spurred reclamation efforts in others. We'll hear how the advent of fracking is being used to feed the Brunswick 1,358 megawatt, natural gas plant, which began utilizing this cheap energy source in April 2016. \$1 billion in customer savings is expected over the life of the station, compared with the next-best option for supplying power. We will tour the plant and discuss issues related to siting, installing, and maintaining a gas supply line. In this same rural vicinity titanium and zircon mining operations took place between 1997 - 2016 to produce chloride ilmenite and zircon. After the areas were surface mined, the rehabilitation process continues involving a number of activities including soil testing, land surveying, earthworks, re-vegetation and ongoing monitoring activities. Next we'll visit one of Enviva's 510,000 metric ton wood pellet facilities which has been producing biomass for Europe and Asian carbon neutral energy needs since 2012. And yes we also have solar just a few more miles down the road where Amazon purchases power from this 100MW solar facility which covers over 1200 acres of former cropland that had produced peanuts and cotton. Here we will talk about the elements involved in zoning and land-use change and the effects that it has on a predominantly row crop county. This tour will require about a two hour ride by bus each way and includes light walking on mulch, grass and hard surfaces $\sim < 1$ mile total = Handicap challenging 10 hour day

Tour 6 - Urban Farm Marketing, Agri-tourism, Beyond No-Till Supported by SARE

The Gardener's Workshop began in 1998 as a small cutflower farm selling only to local markets. Today it has become so much more. This urban farm now sells at Colonial Williamsburg, florists throughout the Hampton Roads region, supermarkets, farmers markets, a members-only on-farm market, and a bouquet drop-off subscription service. Its owner has



become a leader in the cut-flower growing industry, author, and accomplished speaker. Next stop is Holly Fork Farm a small fruit and vegetable farm, diversifying in recent years to offer classes of all kinds including soap making, gourd painting, canning, etc... Each year kicks off with an Easter egg hunt, followed by strawberry season, into the summer with sweet corn, watermelons, cantaloupes, among other summer crops. Into the fall it offers a large agri-tourism venue including jump pad, wagon rides, barrel train, pumpkin patch, and finishing the year with Christmas trees. Lunch will be at the farm under the pavilion. The afternoon will be at Davis Produce, a father/son farm spanning two generations of retired Extension Agents. This farm has 30+ years of no-till research. Davis Farms continues today to pioneer new farming practices as a private research farm. Research on this farm utilizes grants, partnerships with local Soil and Water Conservation District and Virginia Cooperative Extension as well as private industry. One of the farm's most notable successes has been innovations utilizing high biomass cover crops in no-till pumpkin production. Light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging 10.5 hour day



Tour 7 - Great and Big

On this tour you will see/hear about a \$4.3M renovation project to turn industrial waterfront not only into a beautiful park but one that is environmentally responsible with a bio retention area and storm water runoff captured under the parking lot, cleaned and dispersed into the Elizabeth River (also on Tour 16). Next you will talk with partners of Healthy Chesapeake and tour the Women's Jail production garden (also on Tour 16) - learning about different training and support activities improving food access. From there you will take a walking tree tour around the City campus with the originator of 8 tree tours like this. We will then stop to see a special agriculture themed planetarium show. Lunch will be provide by and at the Izaak Walton League local headquarters on the beautiful river banks in Deep Creek. Next we will take a quick look at the Great Dismal Swamp, a national wildlife refuge, and hear some of the history. To continue the history we will visit the newly opened Historical Battlefield and Waterways Museum, have a beer and tour at Big Ugly Brewery and lastly take a short walking tour around the Chesapeake Arboretum (also on Tour 16 and 24). Light walking on mulch, grass and sidewalks ~ 1.5 miles total = Handicap challenging 10.25 hour day @

Tour 8 - Outer Banks

North Carolina Master Gardeners will take you around the Outer Banks Arboretum and Teaching Garden which serves as an outdoor classroom, providing horticultural education highlighting our coastal ecosystem. Next you will see the ocean, salt marshes, Bodie Island and some of the 400 species of birds that migrate through the area or buy a ticket to climb the Bodie Lighthouse for panoramic views. Lunch will be at the Dare County Extension office followed by a visit





to the North Carolina Aquarium on Roanoke Island and stop at the Weeping Radish Brewery (also on Tour 15) before returning back to Virginia. Light walking on mulch, grass and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging Closed-toe shoes for aquarium and requirements for optional Lighthouse climb. 10 hour day @

Tour 9 - Planes, Grains and Chains(aws) – Agricultural Economics & Community Development in Action



Partnered with the NACAA Professional Improvement Council's Agricultural Economics & Community Development Committee, this tour will focus on industry and agribusiness vital to the communities they serve. First you will visit the Naval Air Station Oceana where operations continue 24 hours a day, 365 days per year to support flight operation requirements of aircraft assigned to the Commander, Strike Fighter Wing Atlantic, Commander, and Fleet Logistics Support Wing. You'll see and learn about the Station established in 1943, encompassing 5,916 acres and 250 aircraft, valued at \$823 million when buildings are included. Then off we fly to tour STIHL's state-of-the-art manufacturing facility for over 160 countries, hear about the history of STIHL (also on Tour 17), and see many of the machines of yesteryear in their onsite museum. We will lunch at the Virginia Beach Farmers Market, which is open yearround and features a variety of agriculturally-inspired shops and related businesses including the Master Gardener Kitchen Garden and a Rural Heritage Center. Next we will stay afloat on issues of trade and commerce in agricultural products when we stop at the Port of Virginia (also on Tour 17) to get a bird's eye view of the port, learn about its history, current operations and future plans to compete in the global marketplace. Thirsty for more, we'll show you the state of the art facility at the Hampton Roads Sanitation District where you'll learn about the Sustainable Water initiative for Tomorrow (SWIFT), a program that cleans wastewater and recharges the local aquifer to reduce subsidence of the land. Lastly we will visit Perdue Farms, Inc. whose platform is "We believe

in responsible food and agriculture." Perdue runs diversified agri-businesses, sourcing, purchasing, and processing agricultural commodities and offers a portfolio of products, including grains, soybean meal, blended feed ingredients, and top-quality oils for the food industry and services.



Tour 10 - Home Delivery Lettuces/ Greens, Aquaculture, Niche Crops and Antique Tractors Supported by SARE



This tour will begin at The Neighborhood Harvest (TNH) farm in Suffolk, Virginia. In 2012, TNH ventured into greenhouse farming and began supplying fresh basil to local restaurant suppliers and grocers in Hampton Roads, Virginia. Today, TNH operates in 19,000 square foot of greenhouse space year round and delivers fresh hydroponically grown lettuce varietals to more than 4,000 Hampton Roads residents. TNH delivers weekly subscriptions to homes in the Hampton Roads, Virginia area, with a population exceeding 1.5 million residents. In addition to lettuces, greens, herbs, and micro-greens produced, TNH offers its customers a variety of bakery items, eggs, dairy, craft beverages, soups, deli items and dressings. Lunch will be at Keystone Truck & Tractor Museum which opened in 2010 and draws more than 10,000 visitors annually with over 60 trucks and 180 tractors on display. The afternoon will be at Randolph Farm, Virginia State University's teaching, and research farm. The 416-acre farm is home to a variety of topic areas including: traditional row crops, niche/new crops, alternative cropping methods, horticultural crops, nutrient management, water quality, small ruminants and aquaculture. Tour participants will learn about Urban Agriculture Systems, Aquaculture, Hydroponic/ Aquaponic Greenhouse Systems, High Tunnel Production of Crops, Berry Production and Small Ruminants. Light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging 10 hour day @

Tour 11 - Virginia's Eastern Shore Agriculture Supported by SARE



Ballard Fish and Oyster Company is the parent company of Cherrystone Aqua Farms. They have been producing the best clams and oysters in the world for over 115 years. Today the 5th generation Ballards produce the great shellfish and their reputation for quality, consistency, and service is unsurpassed. This tour will observe how they hatch their own spat (baby shellfish), produce and package their own shellfish, all while maintaining or improving their growing areas water quality. Next stop, Mattawoman Creek Farms began in 2005 and is today a certified organic farm. Their farming practices promote healthy soil and marshlands, and support the restoration of the Chesapeake Bay. Located on the Eastern Shore of Virginia and warmed by the waters of the Chesapeake Bay and Atlantic Ocean, their family farm enjoys a long growing season and fertile farmland. They grow leafy greens, root crops, tomatoes, potatoes, squash, melons, herbs, beans, and peppers, just to name a few. Lunch will be at the Virginia Tech Eastern Shore Agriculture Research and Extension Center (ESAREC). After lunch, the tour will visit and see on-going research focusing soil health, multi species cover crop growing methods, vegetable production and on-farm food safety. Light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging. 10 hour day 🙆



Tour 12- Historical Virginia

Take a step back in time and explore Virginia's historic triangle. We will travel to Colonial Williamsburg and explore the historic homes and gardens of prominent Virginians, who lead the way towards revolution in America. See how Williamsburg and Virginia transitioned from a colony into a state wanting freedom from English authority. We will end at Yorktown Battlefield, where General George Washington led an allied force of French and American troops to victory against Lord Charles Cornwallis and his British garrison. The actions at Yorktown would ultimately lead to a birth of a new nation.

This tour will require a 1.5-hour bus ride each way. Participants should expect to walk for long periods of time.

Tour 13 - Sea to Stars



Core research and extension programs at the Virginia Seafood AREC focus on seafood safety, seafood quality of wild caught and cultured animals and products, business and marketing support for the commercial and aquaculture industries, engineering, thermal processing, intensive saltwater recirculating aquaculture, and



education/ outreach for industry and consumers. Then we will visit the Virginia Air and Space Center (VASC), a museum and educational facility in Hampton, Virginia that also serves as the visitors center for NASA's Langley Research Center and Langley Air Force Base. We will finish at Langley Research Center (LaRC), the oldest of NASA's field centers. It directly borders Langley Air Force Base and the Back River on the Chesapeake Bay. LaRC has focused primarily on aeronautical research, but has also tested space hardware at the facility, such as the Apollo Lunar Module.

This tour will require a 1-hour bus ride each way. Participants should expect to walk for long periods of time. 10.5-hour day ^(a)

Tour 14 - Southeast Virginia Crops



Come along with us and tour the many integral crops of Southeast Virginia Agriculture. Guided by the local agent you will get to experience Commonwealth Gin in Windsor, VA. This large gin provides ginning, marketing, warehousing, and production assistance to their customers. Next on the tour is the Wakefield Peanut Company that has been in business for over 150 years. They pride themselves on upholding their motto "From the field to the storefront" (Please note that those with peanut allergies should not attend this tour). This tour will also be visiting the Tidewater Agricultural Research and Extension Center which was opened in 1914 and has multiple research and extension programs including row crop agronomy and pest management, as well as swine production. Lunch will be provided by the Suffolk Mater Gardeners at this location. The final portion of the tour will take you to Amadas Industries in Suffolk, VA. Amadas has been in business since 1963 and manufactures peanut harvesting equipment, irrigation reels, and multiple other types of agricultural equipment. Closed toed shoes are required and will include light walking (approximately 1 mile). 9.5-hour day leave

Tour 15 - Air, Water and Land

The first stop on this tour is the Wright Brothers Memorial met their criteria for privacy, steady winds, and wide-open non-vegetated spaces. A little down the road an inland we will take a look at the Nature Conservancy, an extensive ecological preserve on North Carolina's Outer Banks that protects a remarkable range of unique habitats, including forested dunes, interdune ponds, marshes, and wetlands. Box lunches from a local eatery will be provide to eat on the bus or before touring the Elizabethan Gardens on Manteo featuring collections of hydrangeas, camellias, historic herbs and a wide variety of native coastal species. We will take a few minutes to check out the historic Weeping Radish Brewery **(also on Tour 8)** for an afternoon respite before heading back to the Convention Center. **Light walking on mulch, grass and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging 10 hour day**

Tour 16 - The Food Desert and Oasis

First we will take you to see and hear about projects at Oaklette United Methodist Church funded by Virginia Dare Soil and Water District and the Elizabeth River Project. Next we will go to tour "Nature's Classroom" at the Chesapeake Arboretum walking some of the trails and seeing the



gardens around the Historic Farmhouse. A short drive will take us to the Historic Battlefield and Waterways



Museum where you will tour and have a presentation on the historical significance of the Battle of Great Bridge, the Albemarle & Chesapeake Canal and the Dismal Swamp Canal (also on Tour 7). Lunch will be provided by the Izaak Walton League which has fought for clean air and water, healthy fish and wildlife habitat, and conserving special places for future generations. After lunch Healthy Chesapeake partners will share information at the Women's Jail and SECEP facilities two different facilities producing food for food desert clientele in Chesapeake and providing unique training opportunities, respectively, for the inmates and mentally challenged youth. We will take a photo stop at the National Champion Laurel Oak (also on Tour 22) before going to local favorite Big Ugly Brewery (also on Tour 7) for a beer tasting and tour. Lastly we will check out the views at Elizabeth River Park which was created from the industrial waterfront under the new Jordan bridge (also on Tour 7).

Tour 17 - Field to Sea





First we will visit the Hampton Roads Sanitation District (HRSD), formed in 1941 and learn about safe and effective use of biosolids for cropland application. Next, we will tour the STIHL's state-ofthe-art manufacturing facility for over 160 countries, hear about the history of STIHL Inc. **(also on Tour 9),** and see many of the machines of yesteryear in their onsite museum. Our third stop is one of two grain buying stations in Virginia Beach and our largest grain farmer. A multifaceted agriculture operation, dealing with grain export, production, and grain buying, they pride themselves on being accommodating to the grower, with flexible harvest hours, and timely movement of grain through many avenues including the Port of Virginia. For our final stop we will tie it all together and get a bird's eye view of the Port of Virginia **(also on Tour 9)**, learn about the history, current operations, and future plans for the port to compete in the global marketplace with a focus on agriculture products. Closed toed shoes are required with light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1 mile total = Handicap challenging. Participants will need to submit their full name (as it appears on their driver's license) with full license information (state and license #) at least two weeks prior and have their driver's license with them on the tour to gain access to the Port.

Tour 18 - Agribusiness and Hydroponics Supported by SARE



Agribusiness within the Virginia Department of Corrections includes sustainable programs in cover crops, no-till, rotational grazing, aquaponic production of lettuce and tilapia. They also market their all natural feeder beef through VCA, raise 1600 catfish and harvest turnips and collards with a single-leaf cut machine. This a diversified farm giving inmates training and experience with beef, vegetables, greenhouses, freezer plant/processing, grist mill (where they grind their own white corn into grits), grain and hay. Offender/detainees annually assist with the 7,000 acres of pastures, 1,800 acres of grain crops, 6,800 acres of forest, and 600 acres of vegetables. Revenue from the sale of farm and dairy products is deposited to the Commonwealth of Virginia general fund. The Agribusiness program may use a portion of this for equipment or repair and construction of Agribusiness facilities. Here we will enjoy a catered lunch before moving on to Cross Country Farms which began producing hydroponic lettuce and off-season tomatoes to help bolster the profitability for this traditional row cropping family. This tour will require moderate walking in farm field situations. Closed toe shoes are advised. \sim 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging

Tour 19 - Virginia Beach Gardens

First, we will tour Red Wing Park, a 97-acre park located off of General Booth Blvd. known for its beautiful gardens and annual Cherry Blossom Festival. The Red Wing Park property was acquired by the county in 1879 and was formerly known as the "Old City Poor Farm." It was developed into a park by the City in 1966 and is now home to many gardens, including the Reba S. McClanan Fragrance Garden, established through the joint efforts of Virginia Beach Parks & Recreation and the Council of Garden Clubs of Virginia Beach, and the Miyazaki Japanese Garden. Then, we will join Aquarium staff in the education classroom to learn more about Horticulture at the Aquarium. The group will tour a variety of gardens located on the Aquarium property including the Wildflower Garden, along the North Marsh Loop, Nature Trail, and South Marsh Loop. The tour will highlight the native plants that are found on the property, how they maintain the gardens, the problems they encounter and how they solve these problems. Finally, we will tour the demonstration gardens at the Hampton Roads Agricultural Research and Extension Center, an outreach project of the Virginia Beach Extension Master Gardener Volunteers. The gardens are open to the public and used for tours, workshops, and passive education. The area includes: Theme Gardens (Bog/Water Garden, Butterfly Garden, Children's Garden, Daylily and VA Hybridizer Daylily Gardens, Edible Landscaping Garden, Enabling Garden, Entry Beds, Four Season Bulb Garden, Fragrance & Texture Garden, Groundcover Gazebo, Native Plants Garden, Ornamental Grasses, Perennials Comparison, White Garden, Winter Garden), an arboretum, and an All-American Selections Trial garden. Light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging. 6.5 hour day @



Tour 20 - Chesapeake Bay Water Quality, Organic Hemp, and Farm to Table Supported by SARE

The Brock Environmental Center was built by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) (also on Forestry Pretour and Tour 25) to engage, inform, and inspire generations about the environment and efforts to defend the nation's most valuable and threatened natural resource, the Chesapeake Bay. The center is an innovative example of environmentally sensitive and smart building design, among the first in the nation to embrace energy and water independence. A boat trip will take you onto the Chesapeake Bay to learn more about oyster restoration, aquaculture and aquatic life in the region. Lunch will be at the Virginia Beach Farmers Market, where local farmers can market their produce to the City's estimated 450,000 inhabitants. After lunch, tour will visit Veg Out Gardens, an organic certified greenhouse operation which has expanded its focus in 2019 from garden plants to industrial hemp production. Next stop will be Cullipher Farms, owned and operated by 4th, 5th, and 6th generation Culliphers. They are proud of the quality fruits and vegetables sold at their farm stand, u-pick patches, and CSA subscriptions. Cullipher Farms utilize intensive cover cropping, strive to increase soil organic matter through addition of compost and chicken litter, and follow a nutrient management plan. Last stop is Land of Promise (LOP) Farm which operates close to 8,000 acres in grain crops and livestock production. Their swine farm over the years has shifted from strictly commercial production to a premier show pig breeder and supplier of swine for human medical research purposes. LOP uses Good Agriculture Practice (GAP) certification, producing sweet corn to wholesale markets in the Coastal Virginia area. They also are home to the largest pecan grove in the area and offer pecans for u-pick in the fall and winter. Light walking on mulch, grass, sand, and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging 9.25 hour day 🝙



Tour 21- Growing Water

TWe will first show you the Hampton Roads Agriculture Research and Extension Center **(also on Tours)** for Virginia Tech which focuses on: nursery production, landscape maintenance, turfgrass, small fruit production, and urban stormwater management. Next we will go the Hermitage Museum noted for its excellent art collection where we have a box lunch in the shade. After lunch you will take a guided walking tour looking closely at brackish water buffer gardens, rain gardens, as well as oyster reef restoration projects.

Tour 22 - The National Champion Tree

For this tour we will be visiting 6 different tree species that are the largest in the United States and 2 significant trees. You will see a Persea borbonia, P i n u s



serotina, Liriodendron tulipifera, Quercus phellos, Quercus laurifolia **(also on Tour 16)** before lunch at the Izaak Walton League whose mission is to insure clean air and water, healthy fish and wildlife habitat, and conserving special places for future generations. We will then go and see Diospyros virginiana, Quercus nigra (State Champion), Quercus virginiana (significant tree), and lastly Quercus pagoda. Byron Carmean and Gary Williamson will be your tour leaders-they have identified the most National Champion trees in the country.

Tour 23 - Something Across the Water



This tour begins viewing and hearing about the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel which when it opened in 1964 was designated as one of the seven engineering wonders of the modern world. Over 130 million vehicles cross it annually. From here we will also take a rare behind scenes visit of Tunnel Island #2. For lunch we will drop by the Eastern Shore Agricultural Research and Extension Center a leader in commercial agriculture production focusing on: Foodborne illness research and prevention, weed management technologies, vegetable disease epidemiology, soil and nutrient management, molecular identification of plant and human pathogens, drones to monitor and assess plant health, and advanced pollinator habitats. Next we will take a wine tasting at the Chatham Vineyards and Winery, constructed in 2005 and currently producing 3,000-5,000 cases annually on 20 acres of high-density French vinifera varietals. Our fourth stop is C & E Farms, whose innovation and dedication to quality and service have made Red Barn Label green beans a top choice. C&E works with 34 different growers up and down the eastern seaboard of the U.S. producing 40% of all green beans. Our last spot is Kiptopeke State Park which is 526 acres and offers recreational access to the Chesapeake Bay-a great place to explore unique migratory bird habitat along the Atlantic flyway. Tour 24 - Trees of Tidewater

Virginia Beach's urban forest is a vital component of the city's infrastructure, as important as efficient transportation and clean water. Virginia Beach has a high level of commitment



to protecting trees and sharing knowledge about the important environmental, economic and social roles trees play in building healthy sustainable communities. Take a tour of the many tree species in the Virginia Beach Municipal Center. Next, we'll head to Chesapeake to a peach orchard. Slabaugh Farms was established in 1992 as a family-owned farm in Chesapeake, Virginia raising beef cattle, corn, soybeans, wheat, and oats. The opportunity arose in 2009 to start a peach orchard, and James Wenger graciously offered his assistance and years of experience in raising peaches to the project. The orchard has grown quickly with 400 trees planted in the first year and 1,500 trees planted in 2010 including a few apple, pear, and nectarine trees in addition to the peach trees. Mount Pleasant Farms was born in 2011 with the first peach harvest from the new orchard. Then, we will head to the City of Norfolk's Tree Farm where they grow trees for planting in their cityscape. Last we will stop at the Chesapeake Arboretum (also on Tour 7), a 48-acre "Nature's Classroom" that promotes horticultural and environmental awareness through displays, education and research. It is designated a Virginia Treasure, an initiative to highlight important ecological, historic, scenic and recreational lands across the state. Dedicated at its current site in November 1996, it boasts one of Virginia's finest trail systems that wanders through a mature hardwood forest with many varieties of trees and plants. Light walking on mulch, grass, and hard surfaces ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging 9.5 hour day leave the second second

Tour 25 - Pagoda Art and Water

The tour begins with the Pagoda Tea House, a gift to the City of Norfolk from the Taiwan Provincial Government in 1983. Materials for the building were manufactured in Taiwan and shipped to Norfolk where the Pagoda was meticulously assembled by Taiwanese artisans. The naturalistic landscape surrounding the Pagoda embodies many of the Chinese concepts of harmony and tranquility. Next, tour participants head to The Chrysler Museum of Art. Established in 1903, the museum borders downtown Norfolk and the Ghent district. One of the major art museums in the




Southeastern United States, the Chrysler Museum has fifty galleries, a growing collection of more than 30,000 objects, an interactive family space, and the only glass studio of its kind in the Mid-Atlantic region. For a relaxing, outdoor lunch, tour attendees will then shuttle to one of the area's popular local fishing destinations, the Lake Lawson/Lake Smith Natural Area, a 42-acre preserve with more than 12,000 feet of shoreline located in the Bayside Borough of Virginia Beach. The tour concludes at the Brock Environmental Center, built by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation in 2014 to engage, inform, and inspire generations about the environment and how we can all help Save the Bay. The Center, located at Pleasure House Point in Virginia Beach, is an innovative example of environmentally conscious building-among the first in the nation to embrace energy and water independence-and advances CBF's efforts to defend one of the nation's most valuable and threatened natural resources, the Chesapeake Bay.

Tour 26 - Welcome to Historic Smithfield

Welcome to Smithfield- home of ham, history, and hospitality! We will start our tour at the Smithfield Innovation Center (Smithfield Foods). Smithfield Foods is a leading consumer packaged meats company. They are a \$15 billion global food company and the world's largest pork processer and hog producer, committed to providing good food in a



responsible way. They employee over 54,000 employees throughout the company. Smithfield Foods was founded in Smithfield, VA 80 years ago and they are still based there! We will visit their Innovation Center tour their pilot plant. We will then have a guided tour of



Historic Downtown Smithfield on the bus followed by some free time to walk around town. You can enjoy local shops or the Isle of Wight County Museum featuring the world's oldest ham and peanut! After free time, we will visit Blue Sky Distillery. Blue Sky Distillery is an award winning micro distillery in Smithfield, VA that produces handcrafted spirits. They have a tasting room, store, and offer tours. Some of their products include The Legend of Blackbeard's Point, Dog Star Vodka, Triple Deuce Whiskey, and Flying Dragon Spiced Rum. From Blue Sky, we will visit the Windsor Land Lab. Windsor Land Lab is located at Windsor Elementary School and is a working farm through the Career and Technical Education department. Students get the opportunity to build fence, coops, and other things as well as work with animals and crops. The lab has heifers, chickens, goats, and pigs. They have an operating greenhouse and bee hives as well as several crops. This program helps students learn more about the agriculture industry and prepare for careers in the industry or other agribusiness areas.

This tour will require about an hour ride by bus each way and includes moderate walking in farm field situations. Closed toe shoes must be worn and a waiver must be signed as well. ~ 1-2 miles total = Handicap challenging 10 hour day @

Tour 27 - A Touch of Virginia Beach History



Our first stop will be the Military Aviation Museum, home to one of the largest private collections of World War I and World War II era military aircraft in the world. Each of the planes has been beautifully restored to its prior military condition, using original parts whenever possible. Most of the planes are airworthy and flown at the museum during flight demonstrations and at air shows throughout the year. Some being the last flight-ready aircraft of their time, and all of them being one of a kind. Next, we will see the historic Francis Land House, which was once surrounded by hundreds of acres of farmland. It served as the home of Francis Land VI, a wealthy plantation owner from a prominent family in Princess Anne County, Virginia. While the architecture of the house is Georgian, the interior style is Federal. The house is furnished with a mix of period antiques and reproductions to interpret the period that Francis Land VI and his wives and daughters were in residence, circa 1805-1819. Tours of the Francis Land House consider plantation life; the roles of the household members, both free and enslaved; Federal style; and ways that the formation

of the new nation affected private lives. Tour guides also discuss the colorful history of the house in the 20th century, when it functioned as the Rose Hall Dress Shop. A tour of the herb, vegetable and fruit gardens will conclude the tour. Last, we will stop at the Cavalier Hotel. For nearly a century, the grand Cavalier has stood sentinel over the Virginia Beach Oceanfront. Perched on a grassy hill overlooking the Atlantic Ocean, Virginia's most iconic hotel has welcomed ten U.S. Presidents, countless celebrities and distinguished guests from around the world. The history within the stately architecture reveals a sense of timeless elegance and glamour and earned the Cavalier a spot on the National Register of Historic Places. Within the hotel, we will tour Tarnished Truth Distilling Company, offering a portfolio of great tasting spirits within its tasting room and its rustic tavern, The Hunt Room. Indulge in the distinctively styled distillery, where the ancient process of barrel aging fine libations is brought to life in handcrafted copper & brass equipment by our Kentucky partner, Vendome.

Tour 28 - Gardens and Go



On the way to the horticulturally renowned Norfolk Botanical Garden (also on Horticulture Pretour), the tour will stop by Norfolk's Safe Creative Community Space, a community garden/ food production space that serves to feed the community and educate the youth participants in horticulture. In collaboration with Virginia Cooperative Extension, this space is managed by Teens With a Purpose, a non-profit, youth development organization formed in 2007, with the goal of providing a platform that empowers young people to impact their communities. Tour attendees will then proceed to Norfolk Botanical Garden, which includes 175-acres, with more than 60 themed gardens that can be viewed by tram, boat or by foot. Themed gardens include the Bristow Butterfly Garden, the Sarah Lee Baker Perennial Garden, the Virginia Native Plant Garden and the Bicentennial Rose Garden. Each of these gardens allow guests to see a variety of plants - from the cultivated to the wild. Attendees of this tour will be treated to The Land, Lake & Lunch Tour, ideal for individuals interested in the full Garden experience! Tour package includes admission to the Garden, guided boat tour, narrated tram tour, gourmet boxed lunches and one hour rental of the Garden Picnic Pavilion. Immediately following




the garden tour, the tour bus will drop by Norfolk International Airport, which sits just next door to the garden, so that attendees looking to catch a flight home may do so.

Tour 29 - Reading the Farm Supported by SARE

This tour will be visiting New Earth Farm located in Pungo area of Virgnia, Beach, VA. New Earth Farm is an award-winning, 21-acre sustainable working and educational farm. Although not certified organic, vegetables are grown using only biological methods.

New Earth Farm was founded by John Wilson in 1995 when he bought a tractor and a compost turner and leased a few acres off Indian River Road in southern Virginia Beach. Into



the ground out front he pounded a homemade sign: New Earth Farm. He has dedicated the past 30 years of his life to all-natural farming and sustainable practices. In 2017 John Wilson was ready to transfer ownership. Luckily, a team of dedicated people, who worked with Farmer John for many years, were ready to take on the challenge. Kevin Jamison, Marion and Paul Shultz and Eric Cardon partnered together to continue to carry out the mission of New Earth Farm.

Through the practices of cover cropping, crop rotation and chicken rotation, New Earth Farm actively seeks to build the healthiest soil possible, nurture the natural ecology of the land, and provide the community with fresh nutrient-dense produce.

Getting to VA Beach

VA Beach is located in the Southeastern corner of Virginia. By car, when approaching from the west, the easiest routes are Interstate 64, U.S. 460 or U.S. 58. From the north and south, convenient routes are Interstates 85 or 95, U.S. 17 and U.S. 13 (crossing the world-famous Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel, a 17-mile span connecting Virginia's Eastern Shore with Virginia Beach). These routes intersect with Interstate 64, which connects with the Virginia Beach-Norfolk Expressway (Interstate 264) and leads directly to the Virginia Beach oceanfront.

By air, Virginia Beach is approximately 17 miles from the Norfolk International Airport (ORF) and approximately 42 miles from the Newport News/Williamsburg (PHF) International Airport. Both airports offer service from multiple carriers with daily flights (some direct) from across the country.

You can also visit VA Beach by train. Amtrak offers train service into Newport News (with connecting bus service to Virginia Beach). Amtrak bus service is available between the train station and 19th Street and Pacific Avenue. Reservations are required. Call Amtrak at 800-USA-RAIL (800-872-7245) or visit them at www.amtrak.com.

Getting around VA Beach

The Virginia Beach Convention Center is a stand-alone property just a short stroll from our headquarter hotel, The Doubletree VA Beach. The Virginia Association of Ag Extension Agents (VAAEA) will be running shuttles to help you get to and from other properties that we have under contract. Most of the hotels are oceanfront and the Doubletree offers a shuttle to and from the beach along with a picnic lunch for a nominal fee. Ride sharing UBER and LYFT services are plentiful. If you choose to drive, parking is free in Virginia Beach and at the Convention Center.

Rudee Tours will be our guide for an hour and a half dolphin watching trip in the Chesapeake Bay. The Cruise will travel along the coast looking for Dolphins. NACAA Hotel Facilities Fee

Since 2004, NACAA initiated a facilities fee for lodging at the AM/PIC. All Active & Life Members in attendance are asked to stay at the contracted hotel facilities. It is your choice to stay elsewhere, however, if you do not register for lodging through the NACAA registration process (minimum of 1 night), a \$250 fee will be added to your overall registration.

Why? NACAA contracts with several hotels 4 years in advance of each meeting in order to meet the lodging needs of our membership. The contracts which are signed have specific room night commitments, which if not met, will have to be purchased by NACAA. As NACAA's liaison to the Outstanding Young Farmers Program, I've had the privilege to attend the past two Awards Congresses. Both have been amazing experiences; special from beginning to end! The 2020 Congress was the 64th of this annual event. It started by being greeted at the airport and escorted to our hotel shuttle by Outstanding Young Farmer Alumni Jerry Barnes who was obviously thrilled to be there and thrilled to welcome alumni and newcomers to the event! Every meal, program, tour and session was filled with the same kind of enthusiasm from all of the alumni, officers and organizers of this yearly event. The alumni are like a huge family with members from all over the country. The top ten finalists are treated like royalty during the awards congress and it is well deserved when you hear all of their accomplishments. These new finalists are quickly taken into the family. It is amazing how many return for the rest of their lives.

The Outstanding Farmers of America is comprised of past nominees of the Outstanding Young Farmer Program. The group is designed to facilitate an exchange of ideas and friendship that encourages excellence and involvement in agriculture and the local, state, and national community. There are approximately 1,500 members of the OFA across the nation who utilize their connections with each other in a strong networking format to assist farmers and promote the importance of America's farming community. The group's mission is "to be the premier recognition program by celebrating the diversity, productivity and efficiency of today's agricultural professionals." Their vision is to be a Positive Voice in Agriculture by fostering Strong Relationships by offering the best opportunities in Education and Networking and recognizing efforts in Land Stewardship, Community Involvement and Modern Business Practices.

This program is administered by the Outstanding Young Farmers of America Fraternity, sponsored by John Deere, founded by the United Stated Junior Chamber and supported by us, the National Association of County Agricultural Agents.

The purpose of the Outstanding Young Farmers Program is to bring about a greater interest in the farmer to foster better urban-rural relations through the understanding of the farmers' endeavors, to develop a further appreciation for their contributions and achievements, and to inform the agribusiness community of the growing urban awareness of the importance of farmers and their impact on America's economy. As the farmer's business has changed, so has his or her involvement in the community. Today's farmer has become an active citizen, participating in everything from local and state government to civic groups and charitable organizations. It is not only fitting that farmers be honored for their contributions and achievements it is essential. This award has been established to recognize outstanding achievements in agriculture as well as community involvement.

The National Outstanding Young Farmers Awards Congress is the culmination of the intense independent judging process. Nominees from across the United States are eligible and may be submitted by anyone. Multiple nominations from any one state are permitted; however, following the judging process to determine the semi-finalists, no more than two from any state will be chosen. The selection process narrows the applications down to ten couples who travel to the Awards Congress for in-person interviews. From there, the judges select four couples as the National Outstanding Young Farmers.

Qualifications include:

- Nominees must be between the ages of 21 and 40, not becoming 41 prior to January 1 before the National OYF Awards Congress.
- Nominees must be actual farm operators, deriving a minimum of two-thirds of their income from farming.
- All the information about the National Outstanding Young Farmers Awards Congress and program can be obtained by visiting www.ofafraternity.org.
- National winners are determined based on personal contributions in the following categories:
- Progress in agricultural career (50%)
- Extent of soil and water conservation practices (25%)
- Contributions to the well-being of the community, state, and nation (25%)

The 2021 OYF Awards Congress is slated for February 4 - 7 in Appleton, Wisconsin. Please take some time now and think about deserving young farmers in your area that you could nominate for this honor. If they are chosen as a top ten finalist, it will definitely be a life changing experience for them and you if you choose to participate in the Awards Congress with them. NACAA provides a \$500 stipend for travel to agents that nominate finalists to the program.

Reflections from years in Extension: *Be a thought-provoker*

If all you are is a Wikipedia alternative, then your job outlook is limited. People have access to facts. Extension is more, much more, than providing "just the facts".

You may recall from our history that experiment stations had already been established before the Extension system was. Funding for research preceded funding for Extension. But while discoveries were made, they were not being effectively communicated out to the people of the states – that is, the majority of people were not adopting the new practices.

Something different needed to be done. Some states were already sending Extension Agents out to the people, to live among them, to develop relationships with them, and to encourage, through demonstrations and through relationships, farmers and others to change their practices. That is what Extension was begun to do.

Then, as now, farmers, gardeners, municipal officials, business owners and others, can get into a rut. Ruts are made because something worked, so we go back to it time and time again. But as we travel through the same rut, the landscape around may be changing and while deep in a rut, it is hard to see that.

Unfortunately, the things that worked, and are still working, that are represented by the rut, may not be the best route because of the changed landscape, whether that is a changed economic, social or interpersonal landscape. Yet, people tend to trudge on making the rut deeper and deeper.

I believe that we in Extension have an opportunity, not an easy one, but an important one. Through the years, I have come to believe that one of the most valuable things you can do in Extension is to challenge people to get out of the ruts that define and limit their alternatives to what they have done before.

In fact, sometimes I view myself as the "challenger-in-chief". I want to challenge people, mostly farmers in my case, to critically consider what they are currently doing and see if there is not a better way. I want to broaden the range of alternatives that people consider and not have it be so narrow as to limit their choices. In fact, I want to provoke people to consider something different.

But, let me assure you, that is not universally welcomed! Being in a rut is the comfortable place to be, even if it is not successful. Getting out of it may seem risky. A farm may have made significant investments that reinforce past decisions, that would have to be abandoned or even torn out. But sometimes that is exactly what it will take to chart a better course.

When I work with people, either individually or in groups, I try to challenge what I believe are less productive, less successful, less effective ways of doing things. However, to be successful with that you need to consider how you do it. Do it with humility; they may be encountering risk, while you are not. Do it gently; people don't like to be pushed. But do it firmly; it takes effort to change. Don't expect people to change now; plant seeds. Help people with the questions and problems that will come up or that they will consider in making such a change. And return to it with sensitivity to how they are receiving the advice.

A good method is to pose a question to them. If you want them to think about the impact of something longer term, ask how that decision/practice will play out X years from now. Ask what happens when another assumption changes (kids do/don't come home to work, prices decrease instead of increase, etc.).

Some things we may challenge people on will be personal. That is, we may challenge a decision they have made. Other times, we may challenge them on natural inclinations that don't represent intentional choices, but create a pattern that could be changed. An example of the latter is that I frequently challenge people to work together. Our natural inclination is to do things ourselves, yet that may not be effective or economical.

When we challenge people to re-think how or why they do something, sometimes they will do so and make the decision to continue what they are doing. I'm fine with that, as long as they have considered alternatives and decided what is best for them, because, most of all, I want to provoke people to think.

Recently, I told a younger Educator that we have a platform as Extension Educators. To be valuable, we need to use it, but use it appropriately. You were hired to be more than a megaphone, you were hired to synthesize knowledge and help others apply it. When you do that, and when you help people think outside of the rut, you will have been successful.
