

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA SHARING THE KNOWLEDGE: MASTER GARDENER SYMPOSIUM IN HENRY COUNTY, GA

The State of Georgia has many Master Gardeners who continually need continuing education opportunities to improve their skills. With the many developments and the complexities of horticultural science, the need for Master Gardener Extension Volunteers is essential. In partnership with the UGA Extension Henry County, Henry County Master Gardeners began Henry County Fall into Gardening Symposium in 2018 and have held it every year since except 2020 due to COVID




Figure 3: The QR Code to a brief video on the Master Gardener Fall Into Gardening Symposium.

The Master Gardeners created a brief video promoting their program in 2022 (Figure 3). The program was also open to the public; some participants were not Master Gardener Extension Volunteers. Four horticultural experts gave informative presentations on topics of interest to the participants (Figure 4). The program also included a vendor's marketplace selling items such as plants, pet products, honey, and other related items. Additionally, the Master Gardeners held a silent auction to raise money for their programming efforts (Figure 5).




Figure 1: Information flyer on the Fall Into Gardening Symposium in Henry County, GA.




Figure 2: 2023 Master Gardener Symposium Agenda




Figure 6: Post program survey given out to the participants to rate the quality of the symposium.

At the end of the symposium, the participants were given a program evaluation form (Figure 6). They rated the four presenters from one, being poor to five, excellent, and 80% gave all the speakers a rating of five, and 15% gave them a rating of four. For the question 'I will use something that I learned today,' 85% gave it a rating of five. The Henry County Master Gardeners with Extension support are planning to have more symposiums in the future with new speakers on subjects of interest.

Several of the participants commented, "All of the speakers were interesting. Their presentations were educational, and I have new ideas that I plan to implement in my garden. Thank you for this opportunity," and "This program has been amazing. I have learned much about the type of plants that can make a difference in improving the appearance of my landscape. Many new ideas to think about for my situation."
